Your first three months in the dojo will introduce you to our art and family. If you train hard you will probably attain 9th kyu, or green belt. There is no charge for rank testing. But we do test so that you know you can perform in a real fight. There are nine steps, called kyu ranks, to black belt. There are no guarantees of reaching shodan, or first degree black belt, but we do promise you will be better prepared for the battles of life.

The Training

Bujinkan Budo Taijutsu is the martial arts system of Grandmaster Masaaki Hatsumi. Bujinkan means "Divine Warrior House," or "Warrior Spirit Hall." Bujinkan Budo Taijutsu is the amalgamation of nine individual, although closely related, traditional Japanese Ninja and Samurai families. Nine families, one heart.

In the past these arts were explored in their individual ryu, or family, formats. Through the centuries it was not uncommon that the leadership of one of more martial families would be held by the same person. Eventually, Grandmaster Hatsumi received leadership of the nine schools that comprise the Bujinkan.

The Sensei

Shidoshi Lees first started his training in martial arts at the age of 13. Wanting to train in martial arts he began training in a martial arts school in his home town. Working at the school by cleaning the bathrooms and other duties to pay his tuition, he trained throughout high school until moving onto college. Realizing his early training in martial arts prepared him for competition at tournaments and sparring events but it was incomplete when training him for defending himself in a combat situation he trained in various martial arts throughout college.

He continued his martial arts training while attending college in New Mexico. During a chance encounter with a fellow student at the university gym, he learned that the student trained and taught Taijutsu. Soon after this encounter the Bujinkan Yamaneko Tasukeru Shibu was founded by Mr. Robert Protsman and Sensei Lees attended his first seminar with then 7th dan sensei Jeff Prather in October 1991. He also traveled back and forth to Las Cruces, NM training with Shidoshi Robert Geyer until earning shodan ranking in 1999 under Mr. Prather. Training under the guidance of Shihan Prather he went on to head the Tasukeru Shibu throughout graduate school finally handing it off to a personal student. The Tasukeru Shibu still trains today.

Since then, he has continually trained in Taijutsu both as student and teacher along the way earning the rank of Godan, 5th degree black belt. He moved to Albuquerque in 2001 and has trained and taught in the area with various Bujinkan dojos including the UNM, Bernalillo, Ishimaru, and Jubunnaai dojos. In 2004 he began teaching as sensei of the kids

class at the Jubunnaai dojo. Finally, in 2006 he founded the Fudo Myo Dojo, and became an official branch of the Bujinkan Yamaneko Dojo, or Mountain Cat training hall in 2007.

As an official branch of the Bujinkan Yamaneko Dojo the Fudo Myo Dojo embodies the teachings of both Soke Dr. Masaaki Hatsumi and Shihan Jeffrey Prather, by teaching authentic budo taijutsu and following the guidelines and requirements of the International Bujinkan Dojo.
